From the desk of Dr. Marco Clark

Dear Holy Cross Family and Friends,

Can you believe it's September already?!? I'm excited to spend my first fall here in the tri-campus area.

These first weeks of the academic year have been nothing short of remarkable for my wife and me. The energy on campus is palpable and the feeling of optimism and excitement as a new year begins is in the air. The grounds are beautiful, our campus buildings have received some TLC from our outstanding maintenance and facilities team over the summer, and our professors have returned with renewed zeal. The only thing missing were the students...that is, until last week when we kicked off the year with our Welcome Weekend activities.

Welcome Weekend and the many accompanying events that took place throughout the first week of classes affirmed for me that Holy Cross College is a truly special place filled with many special people committed to learning and growing as scholars, citizens, leaders, and disciples.

During one of our many events in our first week, 65 of our students gathered on a Thursday night at 9 p.m. (almost my bedtime!) to listen to a talk given by Fr. Karl Romkema, C.S.C., himself a former student at Holy Cross College who spoke about "The Spiritual Life is a Smoker." When I first saw the title, I was startled that I didn't know that Fr. Karl was a smoker." I thought I knew Fr. Karl pretty well as we were together for a period in Austin, TX during my years at St. Edward's as he ministered at the nearby Holy Cross parish, St. Ignatius the Martyr Catholic Church. During his talk Fr. Karl stated that the Holy Spirit speaks to us through consolation—feelings of peace, joy, inspiration, and attraction. We have a student body who is serious about their academic pursuits and formation as children of God AND they possess a desire to make a difference in the world.
